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Profile of Niiza


Niiza became a city in November 1970.



Preparing for Disasters

Japan experiences many earthquakes.

You should prepare in advance so that you do not panic when a disaster strikes.



▶ If you feel a tremor...

If you are at home

- Duck under a table or desk to protect yourself from falling objects.
- Do not try to put out fires.
- Do not panic and rush out of your home.

If you are somewhere else

- Stay away from telephone poles, billboards and the like, and protect your head with your bag or other item.
- If you are on the train or in a facility, follow the instructions of the staff.
- If you are driving, park your car on the left side of the road, leave the car key in your car, and evacuate on foot.

Prepare for Typhoons and Heavy Rain

Japan is hot and humid in the summer, with a lot of rain. Particularly between August and October, the risk of flooding due to typhoons is high. Be sure to check the latest weather and evacuation information regularly. For information about evacuation shelters, please see page 5.



Where to Evacuate to If a Disaster Occurs

If an earthquake or other disaster occurs, public facilities such as elementary schools, junior high schools and public halls will become evacuation sites.

Be sure that you know where the nearest evacuation site is from your house.



Resident Registration

- ▶ Resident Certificates

The resident certificate is a document that records and certifies information such as your address and family structure.

You will need it when handling various procedures such as moving and enrolling in/withdrawing from National Health Insurance.

- ▶ Copies of Resident Certificates

Your resident certificate records and certifies your address, household composition, head of household, etc.

If you need a copy of it, bring your personal identification (residence card, special permanent resident certificate, etc.) and complete the necessary procedures at the city office or a branch office.

There is a handling fee of 200 yen per copy.

Notifications for Moving In, Moving Out, or Changing Addresses

► Moving-In Notification

You will need to complete procedures, including this notification, when you move to Niiza from another municipality or overseas.

Be sure to complete these procedures within fourteen days of moving in.

You will need to complete procedures of moving out when moving out of Niiza or when leaving Japan for one year or longer.

You can complete procedures from thirty days in advance of your move.

Family Register Notifications

► Birth Notification

You must submit a birth notification within fourteen days of the birth of your child.

You must submit a death notification within seven days of learning of the death of your family member.

You must submit a marriage notification if you are getting married. You will be legally married from the day you submit the notification.

Personal Seal Registration

▶ Personal Seals

In Japan, personal seals are generally used instead of signatures when concluding a contract or the like.

▶ Personal Seal Registration

The personal seal you register is also called a jitsu-in (registered seal). Bring the seal you wish to register along with your residence card or special permanent resident certificate to the city office.

This document certifies that your personal seal is officially registered. You will need it when you rent an apartment or buy a car.

National Pension

▶ What is the National Pension?

This is a system run by the national government to support the lives of senior citizens, people with disabilities, and the families of individuals who have passed away.

▶ National Pension Members

All residents of Japan between the ages of 20 and 59.

▶ How to Enroll

If you began living in Japan before you turned twenty, you do not need to submit an enrollment notification. If you started living in Japan after you turned twenty, however, you will need to submit an enrollment notification at the city office.

▶ Payment Methods of National Pension Premiums

You will receive payment instructions from the Japan Pension Service via postal mail. You can use the enclosed payment slips to pay at a convenience store or the like.

▶ If You Have Difficulty Making Payments

There are exemption and deferral systems if you have difficulties paying your National Pension premiums due to financial reasons.

Resident's Tax

▶ What Is Resident's Tax?

Resident's tax is a tax paid to the city. Foreign residents in Japan must pay taxes just as Japanese people do.

▶ Who Must Pay Taxes

As a rule, all registered residents of Niiza as of January 1 each year must pay taxes. Even if you move out of Niiza, you must pay taxes to the city if you are a registered resident here as of January 1.

▶ Resident's Tax Declaration

Declare your income for the previous year at the Resident & Property Tax Section by March 15 each year. This is not necessary, however, if you filed your income tax return or if you only have salaried income and your employer filed a tax return with the city office.

▶ Payment Methods

● Paying as an individual

A tax payment notification will be sent to you in mid-June. Use the enclosed payment slips to pay at a convenience store or the like.

● Deducted from salary


If you work for a company, the tax will be deducted from your monthly salary.

National Health Insurance

▶ What Is National Health Insurance?

The purpose of health insurance systems is to ensure that everyone can receive medical care with peace of mind in the event of illness or injury. Foreign residents must also enroll in a public health insurance system or the like.

▶ National Health Insurance Members

- Individuals who will live in Japan for more than three months
- Individuals who are registered residents

▶ Enrollment/Withdrawal

Please complete the necessary procedures within fourteen days of the change.

▶ When to Enroll

- When you move into Niiza
- When you quit your job and withdraw from employee health insurance
- When a child is born
- When you stop receiving public assistance for everyday living

▶ When to Withdraw

- When you move out of Niiza
- When you enroll in employee health insurance
- When an enrolled member dies
- When you start receiving public assistance for everyday living

▶ How to Pay Your Insurance Premiums

Please pay your insurance premiums via regular collection or special collection:

Regular collection: Paying using the payment slips you received.

Special collection: Having the premiums deducted from your pension.

▶ How to Use Your Health Insurance Card

When you enroll in National Health Insurance, you will be issued a Certificate of Eligibility or Notice of Eligibility Information. When you receive medical treatment, please present your eligibility confirmation letter or your My Number Card at the hospital. The amount you pay at the hospital will be significantly reduced.



Important!

Health Insurance Cards has Changed!

The health insurance card will be unified with the My Number card on December 2, 2024. Paper health insurance cards will no longer be issued, and in principle, your certification is confirmed online through your My Number card at medical institutions and pharmacies.

Pregnancy and Childbirth

► If You Become Pregnant

When you find out that you're pregnant, please submit a pregnancy notification to the Public Health Center.

You will receive a Maternal and Child Health Handbook and prenatal health checkup coupons after you submit the pregnancy notification (appointment necessary).

Childrearing Support

► Child Allowance

This allowance is paid to people who are raising a child, and is provided up until the end of the first fiscal year after the child turns eighteen.

► Childrearing Allowance

This allowance is paid to single-parent households and the like that are raising a child. It is provided up until the end of the first fiscal year after the child turns eighteen.

This system subsidizes the medical expenses (personally borne expenses) of children. It is provided up until the end of the first fiscal year after the child turns eighteen.



Elementary School and Junior High School

▶ The Japanese Education System

In general, education in Japan consists of six years of elementary school (ages 6 to 12), three years of junior high school (ages 12 to 15), 3 years of high school and 4 years of college. Of these, elementary school and junior high school are compulsory.

▶ Elementary and Junior High Schools

Although children of foreign residents are not required to attend school, they may enter a municipal elementary or junior high school in Niiza if you wish. The school year starts in April and ends in March of the following year.

▶ Enrollment Procedures and Fees

If you wish to enroll your child in a Niiza municipal elementary or junior high school, please bring personal identification for you and your child and apply at the School Education Section.


There is no charge for tuition or textbooks. Parents/guardians are responsible for school lunch fees and other educational materials.

There is a program that provides subsidies for school supplies and school lunch fees depending on your household income.

Residence

▶ Residence

When you are renting an apartment, a real estate agent will generally handle everything from the consultation to the contract.

In Japan, the following fees are generally required when signing a rental contract:

- Brokerage fee

You must pay a fee equal to half a month to one month's rent if you use a real estate agent.

- Key money

This is money given as a gift to the landlord who owns the place, typically equal to one or two months in rent.

- Security deposit

This deposit, typically equal to one or two months in rent, will be used to restore the place to its original state when you move out.

- Advance rent

You will pay from one to two months in rent for the room you are moving into in advance.

- Fire insurance premiums

Enrolling in fire insurance is required in most rental contracts.

▶ Electricity, Water and Gas

When moving, contact the electric, water and gas companies to turn these utility services on or off.

Things to Be Careful of in Life in Japan

▶ Garbage Disposal

There are rules to follow when disposing of garbage. Be sure to sort your garbage and recyclables properly, and dispose of them by 8:30 a.m. on the designated day of the week at the designated location.

▶ Noise

If you are living in an apartment, be careful not to make too much noise to avoid disturbing your neighbors. Avoid talking loudly and watching or listening to TV or music at a high volume. It is especially important to keep your noise level low at night.

▶ Roommates

It is prohibited to increase the number of tenants or sublease your room without the landlord's permission.

Be sure to consult with the real estate company beforehand.

▶ Pets

Some rental properties do not allow pets. Even if pets are allowed, be sure to take care of them properly, cleaning up after them and taking measures to keep them as quiet as possible.

▶ Odor

Be careful of producing strong odors, since they may be a nuisance to your neighbors. The smells of cooking, cigarette smoke and garbage are often the cause of problems between neighbors.

▶ Using Common Spaces

Hallways and stairways are common spaces. You are not permitted to leave your personal belongings there.

Bicycles

▶ Bicycle and Motorcycle Parking

Leaving bicycles on the street blocks the way, and it can also lead to accidents. Always use the designated bicycle parking lots. There are eight bicycle parking lots near Shiki Station, four near Niiza Station, and one near the north exit of Hibarigaoka Station.

▶ Ride Your Bicycle Safely

The number of traffic accidents involving bicycles is increasing. Be sure to obey the traffic laws and ride your bicycle safely.

Bicycle rules

- Ride your bicycle on the left side of the road. If you must ride on sidewalks, remember that pedestrians have the right of way.
- At intersections, obey traffic signals and road signs
- Turn on your lights at night
- It is illegal to ride under the influence of alcohol
- Always wear a helmet

Garbage and Recycling

How to Dispose of Garbage and Recyclables

▶ Garbage Collection

The city collects household garbage that is properly sorted. Sort your garbage into combustible garbage, incombustible garbage, hazardous waste, and recyclables for disposal.

Be sure to follow the rules for garbage disposal (location, days, times), and use transparent or semitransparent plastic bags to dispose of garbage.

▶ Combustible Garbage (collected twice a week)

- Kitchen waste, unrecyclable paper
- Rubber/leather products
- Unrecyclable plastics (polystyrene foam, dirty plastic/vinyl products, etc.)
- Unrecyclable fabric products (rugs, curtains, cushions, etc.)
- Wood scraps (group into bundles that are 50 cm × 20 cm)
- Other (disposable handwarmers, ice packs, charcoal, kitty litter and other combustible materials)

▶ Incombustible Garbage (collected once every two weeks)

- Ceramics, glass, air-tight glass containers for homemade fruit liquor, mirrors, etc.
- Hardware, metal, aluminum foil
- Household appliances no larger than an 18-liter can (24 cm × 24 cm × 35 cm)
- Other (metal or glass products that cannot be separated from other materials such as plastic or fabric)

▶ Hazardous waste (collected once every two weeks)

- Fluorescent tubes, lightbulbs
- Disposable lighters
- Used dry-cell and button-cell batteries

▶ Recyclables (collected once a week)

- Recyclable plastics (plastic bags, trays and packaging film; plastic toys and buckets, etc.)
- Cans (empty food and beverage cans, other empty cans)
- Glass bottles (empty beverage, seasoning and other bottles; spray cans)
- PET bottles
- Newspapers and newspaper inserts
- Paper cartons
- Cardboard
- Fabric products (clothing, towels, bedsheets, blankets, etc.)
- Magazines and miscellaneous paper (magazines, books, confectionary boxes, paper bags, wrapping paper, etc.)

Large-Sized Garbage

► How to Dispose of Large-Sized Garbage (application required)

Anything larger than an 18-liter can (24 cm × 24 cm × 35 cm) is considered large-sized garbage. A fee is required for all large-sized garbage disposal.

► How to dispose of large-sized garbage

- (1) Confirm the item name, dimensions and quantity
- (2) Call the Large-Sized Garbage Reception Center or apply online
- (3) Purchase Niiza City large-sized garbage stickers
- (4) Write the collection date and your name on the stickers and attach it to the items you are disposing of
- (5) Put your items outside your front door or at the collection site by 8:30 a.m. on the collection day



Spring



Plant Fair

This traditional event takes place every spring. Gardeners from Niiza and other municipalities gather to sell a wide variety of plants, including bonsai.



Bushu Sato Kagura (Spring Festival)

This Kanto region folk kagura (ceremonial dance) has a long history. Designated a Niiza City intangible cultural asset, it is performed every spring as an offering at the festivals of three shrines: Owada Hikawa Shrine, Shinmei Shrine, and Nobitome Hikawa Shrine.


Niiza Comfortable Future City: Oedo Niiza Festival

Strolling Spots in the City




Nobitome Yosui

One of the most popular strolling spots in Niiza, this irrigation channel was created by diverting water from the Tamagawa Aqueduct during the Edo Period. The area along the waterway is home to abundant nature throughout the year, and is especially beautiful during the cherry blossom and autumn foliage seasons. A walking path here is perfect for strolling or jogging, making it a popular spot for residents to relax.

Myo-on Zawa

Myo-on Zawa is a relaxing spot in Niiza that has a natural spring. The area is lush with greenery, making it perfect for strolling and observing nature. It is especially popular in the summer since residents can feel cool there in summer.



Honda Ryokudo (Greenway)

There are various seasonal flowers and trees planted along this greenway. Honda Ryokudo is especially crowded during the cherry blossom and autumn foliage seasons. It is a popular strolling spot for seniors and families with children.

— 東久留米コース Higashi Kurume route








